It is then voluntary to enter into a binding agreement as long such is reached. If ADR fails, the case can still be carried to the court, normally without disclosing the reasons of failure. It should be stressed out that participants do not run the risk of losing control of the process, as it is without prejudice and non-binding - contrary to a judgment at trial (Caller, 2002, pp. 1-2). It is important to keep in mind that ADR is only an option for solving disputes since "everyone has the right to recognition everywhere as a person before the law" (Art. 6, UDHR). Moreover ADR primarily concentrates on resolving personal disputes between parties where their claims are not massive or even perhaps try to resolve other issues involving family relationships, child custody and issues concerning land ownership (Keenan & Riches, 2007).
