Nach der Geburt hat Charlotte Perkins Gilman tiefe Depressionen. Ein Spezialist in Philadelphia verordnet ihr eine Ruhekur, bei der jegliche geistige Anstrengung eingeschränkt und das Schreiben untersagt ist.
